The applicant Lincoln Valley Ranch Inc. of Minden, County of Douglas

State of Nevada, hereby make application for permission to appropriate the public waters of the State of Nevada, as hereinafter stated. (If applicant is a corporation, give date and place of incorporation; if a copartnership or association, give names of members.) July 19, 1968,

Carson City, Nevada

1. The source of the proposed appropriation is High Meadow Springs Name of stream, lake or other source.

2. The amount of water applied for is 1.5 second-feet One second-foot equals 448.83 gals. per min.

(a) If stored in reservoir give number of acre-feet acre-feet

3. The water to be used for Recreation (Golf Course) and domestic Irrigation, power, mining, manufacturing, domestic, or other use.

4. If use is for:

(a) Irrigation (state number of acres to be irrigated)

(c) Other use (describe fully under "No. 11. Remarks")

(d) Power:

(1) Horsepower developed

(2) Point of return of water to stream

5. The water is to be diverted from its source at the following point: NW 1/4 NE 1/4 Sec. 35,

T. 14 N., R. 18 E., M.D.B. & M. Describe as being within a 40-acre subdivision of public survey, and by course and distance to a section corner. If on unsurveyed land,

it should be stated.

6. Place of use NE 1/4, Sec. 34, T. 14 N., R. 18 E., M.D.B. & M. Describe by legal subdivision, if on unsurveyed land it should be so stated.

7. Use will begin about January 1st and end about December 31st, of each year. Month Month
