CERTIFICATE OF APPROPRIATION OF WATER

WHEREAS, John A. Bridges, Agent has presented to the State Engineer of the State of Nevada Proof of Application of Water to Beneficial Use, from Cook Spring through spring, pipeline, stored tank and distribution system for Mining and Milling purposes. The point of diversion of water from the source is as follows: NW 1/4 SW 1/4 Section 1, T.3N., R.38E., M.D.B.&M., or at a point from which the SE corner of Section 7, T.3N., R.39E., M.D.B.&M., bears S. 72° 47' 29" E., a distance of 24,674.58 feet situated in Esmeralda County, State of Nevada.

NOW KNOW YE, That the State Engineer, under the provisions of NRS 533.425, has determined the date, source, purpose, amount of appropriation, and the place where such water is appurtenant, as follows:

Name of appropriator Atlantic Richfield Company
Post-office address Denver, Colorado
Amount of appropriation 0.0167 c.f.s., but not to exceed 0.157 million gallons annually
Period of use, from January 1st to December 31st of each year
Date of priority of appropriation April 30, 1979

Description of works of diversion, manner and place of use:
Water is from the Cook Spring which flows into a 500 gallon round trough, thence is piped 1400 feet by a 1-1/2 inch pipe and stored in a 5,000 gallon water tank, thence is hauled to various exploration sites within the place of use which is described under place of use of the permit. The water is used for mining and milling purposes.

This certificate is issued subject to the terms of the permit.

The right to water hereby determined is limited to the amount which can be beneficially used, not to exceed the amount above specified, and the use is restricted to the place and for the purpose as set forth herein.
