CERTIFICATE OF APPROPRIATION OF WATER

WHEREAS, John Rugar, Jr. has presented to the State Engineer of the State of Nevada Proof of Application of Water to Beneficial Use, from Underground

through well, pump, pressure tank & pipeline for Domestic

purposes. The point of diversion of water from the source is as follows: Within the NW 1/4 SW 1/4 Sec. 15, T. 21 S., R. 61 E., M.D.B. & M., or at a point from which the W 1/4 corner of said Sec. 15 bears N. 57° 19' W., 724.7 feet situated in Clark County, State of Nevada.

Now KNOW YE, That the State Engineer, under the provisions of Section 72, Chapter 46, Statutes of 1937 has determined the date, source, purpose and amount of such appropriation, together with the place to which such water is appurtenant, as follows:

Post-office address: Rt. 1, Box 34, Las Vegas, Nevada
Amount of appropriation: 0.02 c.f.s.
Period of use, from: January 1 to December 31 of each year
Date of priority of appropriation: March 6, 1950

Description of works of diversion, manner and place of use:
Water is developed by means of a drilled well 394 feet deep cased with 100 feet of 10 inch and 374 feet of 8 inch casing and equipped with a Model 5C14 Peerless Pump and a 1,000 gallon pressure tank; thence distributed to the house, lawns, shrubs, etc., through 504 feet of 2 inch, 30 feet of 1 1/2 inch and 60 feet of 3/4 inch pipeline. The place of use is within the same subdivision as the point of diversion.

The right to water hereby determined is limited to the amount which can be beneficially used, not to exceed the amount above specified, and the use is restricted to the place where acquired and to the purpose for which acquired.
