CERTIFICATE OF APPROPRIATION OF WATER

WHEREAS, Robert L. Fuller, Agent has presented to the State Engineer of the State of Nevada Proof of Application of Water to Beneficial Use, from an underground source through a drilled well, pump and distribution system for commercial and domestic purposes. The point of diversion of water from the source is as follows: 8E4 N84 (Government lot 3) Section 8, T.9N., R.29E., M.D.B. & M., or at a point from which the East quarter corner of said Section 8 bears N. 60° 04' 23" N., a distance of 1210.91 feet situated in Mineral County, State of Nevada.

Now Know Ye, That the State Engineer, under the provisions of NRS 533.425, has determined the date, source, purpose, amount of appropriation, and the place where such water is appurtenant, as follows:

Name of appropriator: Delbert K. and Mary Lou Cornella
Post-office address: Hawthorne, Nevada
Amount of appropriation: 0.045 c.f.g., but not to exceed 7.8 million gallons annually
Period of use, from: JANUARY 1st to December 31st of each year
Date of priority of appropriation: November 14, 1973

Description of works of diversion, manner and place of use:
Water is developed by a 230 foot deep drilled well, 8 inch casing, equipped with a stainless steel submersible pump and motor. Water is pumped into the distribution system which serves a mobile home and over-night trailer park, all located in a portion of the 8E4 N84 (Government lot 3) Section 8, T.9N., R.29E., M.D.B. & M.

This certificate is issued subject to the terms of the permit.

The right to water hereby determined is limited to the amount which can be beneficially used, not to exceed the amount above specified, and the use is restricted to the place and for the purpose as set forth herein.
